CITY MANAGER:

Riverside County Fire (Cal Fire) is Considering New Methods for Charging Contract Cities for Fire and Emergency Medical Services: Tri-Data, the consultant hired by Cal Fire to evaluate its standards of coverage met today with City Managers from contract cities to discuss the scope of their study and how the results of their study could impact the way services are delivered and how the cost of fire services would be shared amongst the benefiting contract cities. Cal Fire is of the view that the services that they provide are provided on a regional basis and thus, there is need to review standards of coverage and determine the most equitable ways to split cost among the contracting cities. Under the current practice, each city is charged based on the number of personnel and other resources assigned to the city as requested. Under the plan currently being studied, costs of fire services will be charged to contracting cities based on each cities demand on the system. The charge could be based on the number and type of calls that each contract city generates relative to the total calls for services in the system. So, the number of fire stations and personnel assigned to a particular city may no longer be the basis for charging contracting cities. A draft report is expected to be issued in November.

Car Champs Presents Training and Internship Program to School District: This week, Car Champs made a formal presentation to representatives of Norco High School, Corona High, the School District and the City on their plan to increase the number of students that are certified as Auto Mechanics through training from the School District. Under the proposal presented, Car Champs will provide equipment, parts, instructors as well as the use of their facility in Norco for internship. The High Schools and the District were very receptive of Car Champs' proposal and agreed on follow up meetings to discuss implementation process. The objective of Car Champs' program is to train enough certified mechanics to meet current increasing demand for the trade.

CITY CLERK:

2015 Election – Nomination Period Extended: One of the three incumbents for City Council has not filed nomination papers for the November 3, 2015 election. As a result, the filing deadline for nomination papers has been extended to Wednesday, August 12, 2015 at 6:00 p.m. for everyone except the incumbent. ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT:

Housing: To date, nearly 100 Norco households headed by seniors or disabled individuals have applied for the City's Utility Bill Assistance Program, with 89 officially enrolled. In addition, applications have been approved for 5 loans, 4 grants, and 6 emergency grants for home repairs, while 2 applicants have met eligibility requirements for the First-Time Homebuyer Program. In the past six months, close to \$135,000 in existing loans has been repaid, making these housing programs fully sustainable. Business Development: With support from the Business Enhancement Subcommittee of the Economic Development Advisory Council (EDAC), staff is intensifying its outreach to national and regional chains. Among targeted business categories are specialty grocers, English riding/dressage supplies, and soccer/sports merchants. Restaurant categories currently targeted include quality fast-casual eateries, buffets, breakfast cafés, and family-oriented steakhouses. Staff is also preparing materials for the International Council of Shopping Centers (ICSC) Western Regional Conference in San Diego, September 16-18.

FISCAL AND SUPPORT SERVICES:

Bill Processing: Staff mailed out 1,895 utility bills to Group 4 customers. Staff mailed out 223 delinquent notices to Group 3 utility customers that had not paid their bill on time. On Tuesday, a courtesy door tag was hung at the door of customers that were delinquent in Group 1 by Public Works notifying 73 customers that if they did not pay on Tuesday, their water services would be shut off on Wednesday. There were no shut offs this week since all customers made a payment.

Business License and Cash Receipts: There were 15 new business license applications and 92 renewal Business license applications during the week. Staff processed a combined total of 2,129 cash receipts from the building counter, Parks and

Recreation, utility customers and other miscellaneous accounts receivables totaling \$763,071. The City received \$73,741 in Gas Tax, \$145,412 in General Fund property taxes and \$33,040 from Balboa for the Silver Lakes August rent.

Miscellaneous Accounts Receivable: A total of 7 miscellaneous accounts receivable invoices were sent to individuals/agencies totaling \$8,200. Miscellaneous accounts receivable invoices are sent to bill for EMS services, hydrant meter billing, damage to City property, encroachment permits, loan payments, trash billing to California Rehabilitation Center and any other services provided by the City other than utility billing and business licenses.

PARKS, RECREATION, AND COMMUNITY SERVICES:

Riley Gym Inspection: A 10-point inspection took place at Riley Gymnasium this week by BSN Sports (formally Tomark). This annual safety inspection identifies areas in need of repair/replacement at the facility such as nets, hoops, backboards, cables, padding, etc.

Basketball Coaches Needed: Staff is recruiting volunteer coaches for the upcoming youth basketball league. Anyone interested in volunteering must submit an [online application](#), [sign a waiver](#) and submit to the City of Norco, and have an approved live scan before service is started. Adult Basketball: Adult basketball summer league season began this Thursday with fourteen teams among three divisions. This is two teams more than originally estimated. Winter Ball: Staff is preparing permits for Norco Girls Softball (NGSL) and Norco Little League (NLL) winter ball seasons which run through mid-November at Wayne Makin Shearer Sports Complex, Community Center Park, Clark Field and Parmenter Park. Staff is working with CNUSD facilities on use of school sites for additional practice space outside of city owned parks.

Seniors and Pets Breakfast and Bingo will be held on Saturday, August 8, 2015 at 9a.m. Cost of breakfast is \$3 per person for breakfast.

As a reminder, the Rose M. Eldridge Senior Center has coordinated with Community Action Partnership of Riverside County to provide a Cool Center drop-in site for

vulnerable individuals, seniors, the disabled, and others in need of temporary relief from the heat. Cool Center will be made available to the public when an “Excessive Heat Warning” for 3-5 (for any day at or exceeding 97 degrees, whether they issue a heat warning or not) days is issued for our area. Residents are encouraged to observe safe summer activities in the heat during the warm summer months and to listen or watch for “Excessive Heat Warnings” on radio, television, and local newspaper. Here are some reminders on staying cool:

- Drink plenty of water. Avoid alcohol and caffeine.
- Turn on your air conditioner. Stay in air-conditioned space at home, or someplace cool like the mall, a library, senior center or Cool Center.
- Schedule outside activities before noon or in the evening. Avoid or minimize physical exertion.
- Wear lightweight, light-colored, loose clothing. Wear a wide-brimmed hat, or use an umbrella for shade.
- Slow down—rest in the shade or a cool place every chance you get.
- If you do not have an air conditioner, use a fan. Make sure your windows are open.
- Do not eat heavy meals. Avoid cooking with your oven.

Buildings

- There were some electrical problems inside Nellie Weaver Hall. Staff did some trouble shooting on the GFI plugs and the under-the-counter lights in the bar area. We replaced some of the plugs, and we are still working on the lights.
- Staff spent a good part of the day trying to locate a valve behind Nellie Weaver Hall. Public Works wants to charge the reclaimed water line that is running through the area.
- During the last rain storm, water leaked through the doors going into the Norco Library. This week staff spent a great deal of time installing new channel drains to help prevent this from happening again.



- Staff met with ElRod Fence Company to do a job walk for the Sheriff's Station parking lot security addition. Work will begin next week.

Parks

- Staff flushed the sewer line at Pikes Peak Park again this week as part of our regular maintenance.
- Staff continues to do weeding and trash pick-up around Ingalls. Staff weeded all around Gate 1 as well as removed several yards of dirt from the culvert that is located there, which was washed in during the last rain.
- Sandbags were placed above the Memorial handicap parking area on the Gate 5 road. These are kept in place as "chevrons" until all construction work has been completed.
- Staff cleans the press box and the City trailer after the weekend events. They also grease the cattle chutes and make sure all the event gates and arena

panels are in good working order. Before the events staff chalks the fire lanes and what parking spaces are needed per event.

LMD's and Valley Crest

- A broken water line from the golf course caused some erosion onto Cross Rail Lane horse trail. Valley Crest removed the dirt and groomed this area first thing the next morning.
- Valley Crest damaged two drain lines that ran under the horse trail while grooming District 3. They were repaired and re groomed within 2 days.
- Valley crest spent the best part of two days weeding and improving the entry way into LMD 2 on El Paso at Hidden Valley Parkway. The median on El Paso will be replanted within the next two weeks. Our staff replaced the broken/missing tiles on the "Hidden Valley" entry monument.
- Valley Crest was also directed to remove and replace some plant material in District 3 along Norco Hills Road at Longhorn.
- Valley Crest replaced a 3 inch main line in Neil Snipes Park, removed weeds in the medians on the north end of Hamner Road, and trimmed a tree that was blocking the view of the score board at Wayne Makin.
- Valley Crest groomed all the parks arenas.
- There were two more "hit and run" car accidents this week. One was located right next to the one that happened two weeks ago in LMD 4 on Valley Drive, and one between District 2 and 3 along Norco Hills Road. Police reports have been made on both of these accidents.
- Valley Crest is also working as scheduled in each LMD. Last week they planted new plant material along River Road in District 1.

Animal Control Services

- During the month of July staff issued 413 licenses, a 20% increase over July 2014.
- Twenty citations were issued for licensing, leash law and other violations during July.
- 30 animals were adopted and 36 were redeemed by their owners in July.
- The Norco Animal Shelter did a tour for the Summer Kids Camp. They had a great time touring the entire grounds of the shelter and were introduced to many different animals that come through the shelter on a daily basis.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT:

Water Service Leaks:

- 2585 Corona Avenue – jumped new curb stop onto 1” service while still under pressure
- 4412 Valley View -- jumped new curb stop onto 1” service while still under pressure
- 2440 Reservoir – replaced aged galvanized service with new 1” copper including brass fittings
- 1372 Third – replaced aged blue poly service line with new 1” copper service line and new brass fittings
- 955 Winners Circle – Repaired leaking 1” polyethylene service line
- 5205 Viceroy – Repaired leaking 1” polyethylene service line
- 4180 Mt Baldy – crimped 1” poly service line and replaced the non-operational curb stop

Main Leaks: On Monday 08/03/2015 a Field Operations crew was assigned to excavate and repair a reported water leak at 2141 Parkridge Avenue. To the surprise of the Operations Technicians assigned to this task, excavation of the area unearthed a damaged and previously unknown 10” inline butterfly valve. The valve had obvious

visual damage to the gear housing, the operating stem was bent at a 30 degree + angle, and the 2" operating nut was missing. Without saying, this inline valve was completely inoperable, broken in an apparently mostly closed position, and the cast iron flange face had cracked away from the valve body developing the leak the crew had been assigned to locate and repair.

The crew members executed an emergency shutdown and replaced the broken 10" cast iron valve with a new ductile iron butterfly valve. Replacement of this valve and the ability to set the valve in a normally open operating position will have positive effects on the flow characteristics, fire flow availability and circulation of water in this area of the City. There were no indicators of previous excavations that could have resulted in the damage to the valve that crew members discovered. It is assumed this valve was installed, damaged and then buried during the initial construction of the tract.

Potable water production site maintenance and repair: Downhole video inspection was conducted of Well #9. Video inspection indicates that the 350'+ casing is still in very good condition with only moderate scaling. Video inspection also indicated that the louvered perforations were only partially blocked, a condition that can be improved thru a cleaning process known as "brushing and bailing."

Staff has begun the process of removing all of the obsolete above -ground pipework and electrical panels at well #6. A contractor will be hired after receiving bids to remove the well head, column and shaft assembly.

Reclaimed Water System: Staff has begun flushing and test pumping the reclaimed water pipework system. For testing purposes water from irrigation well "A" is being introduced into the system of pipework and pumps that extends from the River Road Bridge to Ingalls Park. Along with the initial loading of the reclaim pipework, staff will also be test pumping the pressure booster station, calibrating and setting the control parameters of the pressure switches, testing the safety systems and beginning the development of an operational plan for the infrastructure installed along this system to ensure adequate supplies of water can be delivered to the end users.

- Sheriff's Labor Workers cleared weeds and debris on Hamner Avenue from Citrus to the Santa Ana River bridge deck. Labor workers also assisted staff with spreading DG in the trails.

Signs:

- Installed new "REDUCED SPEED AHEAD" signs on River Road near the bridge deck at the entrance to the City, also installed new 45 MPH signs.
- Installed new "No Parking – Horse Trail" signs on Second Street near the High School tennis courts

Street Cleanup: Cleanup from the summer storm is still ongoing as staff time permits. Cleanup was done this week at:

- Norco Drive from Norconian to Morning Star – large volumes of ground rubber playground material washed from the church playground down Norco Drive. Staff swept the area with the bobcat and rotary broom attachment
- Alhambra – Cedar to Norco Drive
- Cleared hillside erosion from the entrance to the reclaim booster station located at the west end of Snipes park
- Harness at Conestoga
- Harness at El Paso
- Harness at Hillside
- Norco Hills at Bridle Crest
- Tuscon at Rock Springs
- Pikes Peak between Sixth and Mt Shasta
- Mt Rushmore and Crestview
- Buckskin and California
- California and Sixth
- Corydon from Del Mar to River Road
- Hillside at Walking Horse

Vine Street and Sagetree Lane Water Project: All points of connection to the distribution system have now been completed. The contractor will now enter into the last phase of the project which includes the abandonment of the aged facilities (slurry

backfill) and removal of the old fire hydrants, cleanup of the area and final paving of the trench lines.


Third Street Improvement Project: Driveways continue to be installed; sub-contractor is installing the storm drain improvements.

Bluff Street and Western Avenue Water Improvements: Project is being advertised for bid. Project includes nearly 4,000 linear feet of 6", 10", 12" or 16" waterline that will replace the aging system. Expect award before Council in late September.

Corona-Norco Unified School District Bicycle and Riverside County Sheriff's Department Bicycle, Pedestrian, and Traffic Safety Flier:

Unattended Child in Vehicle: A parent, legal guardian, or other person responsible for a child who is 6 years of age or younger may not leave that child inside a motor vehicle without being subject to the supervision of a person who is 12 years of age or older. CVC 15620(a), 22516



Disabled Parking: Unless a vehicle displays a disabled license plate or placard, you may not park in parking spaces designated for the disabled by blue lines or signs, nor in the cross-hatched area adjacent to them. CVC 22507.8



No U-Turn Sign: It is unlawful for a driver of a vehicle to fail to obey a sign or signal. CVC 21461 (a)



No Parking Signs: You may not stop or park your vehicle, whether occupied or not, except while actually engaged in loading or unloading merchandise or passengers. CVC 463, 22505, 22506, 22507



Cell Phones: A person shall not drive a motor vehicle while using a wireless telephone unless that telephone is specifically designed and configured to allow hands-free listening and talking, and is used in that manner while driving. CVC 23123 (a)



Passing a Stopped School Bus: When approaching a school bus, from either direction, that is stopped for the loading or unloading of school children, and which displays a flashing red light signal and stop signal arm, you must immediately stop and shall not proceed until the flashing red light and stop arm cease operation. CVC 22454 (a)



U-Turn in Residential District: You shall not make a U-Turn in a residential district when any other vehicle is approaching from either direction within 200 feet, except at an intersection when the approaching vehicle is controlled by an official traffic control device. CVC 22103

Impeding Traffic: You may not drive your vehicle upon a highway at a slow speed as to impede or block the normal and reasonable movement of traffic. Please do not unload your children from the traffic lane and allow them to walk between vehicles in motion. CVC 22400 (a)

Double Parking / Unlawful Curb Parking: You may not park on the street adjacent to another parked vehicle. Vehicles parked must be within 18" from the curb. CVC 22500 (h), CVC 22502 (a)

Red Curbs: No Stopping, standing, or parking, whether the vehicle is attended or unattended. CVC 21458 (a) (1)

The Corona-Norco Unified School District is dedicated to the safety and well-being of all students, parents, community members, and staff. This brochure was written in collaboration with the Riverside Sheriff's Department and the Corona Police Department to provide clarification on laws related to the operation of vehicles in school zones and provide basic bicycle and pedestrian safety tips.



Bicycle Safety

Safety Tips for Motorists

- Slow down near bicyclists.
- Pay attention and avoid driving distractions.
- Look for bicyclists before opening your car door.
- Be aware of oncoming bicyclists when making a left turn.
- Check your blind spot for bicyclists before turning right.
- Always maintain a distance of no less than 3 feet while passing a bicyclist.
- In the event you are involved in an accident on or near school grounds, contact administration and law enforcement.



Safety Tips for Bicyclists

- Ride with the flow of traffic, not against it.
- Ride with a white front light at night.
- Be visible. Don't hug the curb and ride in a straight line.
- Stop at red lights and stop signs.
- Ride 3-5 feet to the left of parked cars to avoid opening doors.
- Always wear a helmet and never ride with headphones.
- Be predictable and use hand signals.
- Always secure your bike when not in use. The District is not responsible for the theft of personal property. BP 5460



Tips to Pick Up and Drop Off Children at School

1. Seat belt ALL passengers.
2. Children 12 and under must ride in back seat.
3. Position your child so they exit curbside, away from traffic.
4. Plan enough time to account for traffic.
5. Familiarize yourself with school drop-off and pick-up practices and always follow them.
6. If the curb says "No stopping or parking at any time," that means for everyone. NO EXCEPTIONS.
7. Do not block crosswalks or fire zone areas.
8. Do not position your vehicle where you will have to back up after drop off.
9. Put your vehicle in PARK and use your EMERGENCY BRAKE.
10. Carpool when possible.
11. Refrain from using any electronic device when behind the wheel.
12. Discuss traffic rules with your child.
13. Take your child to the drop-off area and "practice" at an off-peak time.
14. Explain the purpose of crossing guards.
15. Teach children to use marked crosswalks (walk, never run).
16. Remind children to never enter the street from between parked cars.
17. Have children look left, look right, then look left again when crossing the street.



Speed Limits: The speed limit in school zones is 25 mph when children are present, unless the posted signs show lower speed. CVC 22352 (a) (2) (B)

Fire Lanes: You may not park or leave your vehicle standing, whether attended or unattended, in any location, public or private, that is designated as a fire lane. CVC 22500.1

Jaywalking: You may not walk in the middle of the street that has a traffic control signal at each adjacent intersection. CVC 21954, 21955

Crossing Guards: It is unlawful to disobey the traffic directions of a traffic guard. CVC 2815



Crosswalks: You may not stop or park blocking a marked crosswalk. Vehicles must yield right-of-way to pedestrians in a marked crosswalk or unmarked crosswalk at an intersection. CVC 21970, 22500 (a) & (b), 21950

Fire Hydrants: You may not park within 15 feet of a fire hydrant. CVC 22514 (a)



Park or Parking: "Park or parking" means the standing of a vehicle, whether occupied or not, other than temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading merchandise or passengers. CVC 463




