



City Hall Weekly Highlights

January 28, 2016

To: Honorable Mayor and City Council Members

From: City Departments

CITY MANAGER:

Meeting with City of Eastvale Officials: During the week, Council Members Robin Grundmeyer and Ted Hoffman, along with City staff, met with the Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem of the City of Eastvale and their engineering staff to discuss items of mutual interest and benefits to both cities. The items discussed include:

1. **Hamner Avenue Bridge Replacement Project:** Both cities agreed to continue to collaborate in their efforts to secure local matching funds and to facilitate the timely implementation of this project. The two cities have already signed agreement to provide local matching funds necessary to conduct preliminary engineering and environmental documentation of the project. In the coming weeks, following review and approval by Caltrans, the County Board of Supervisor will be approving the award of engineering contract to T.Y. Lin International. Even though T.Y. Lin International and County staff have significant experience implementing similar projects, including the River Road and Van Buren bridge projects, the Hamner Avenue Bridge Project is expected to take several years to implement.
2. **Hamner Avenue and Citrus Improvements:** With increased traffic at the intersection of Hamner Avenue and Citrus as a result of three schools nearby, growth, and the opening of SilverLakes, the two cities discussed the need to make roadway and possible traffic signal improvements at this intersection to facilitate the follow of traffic. Additionally, staff was directed to look at a plan that would create a u-turn on the north bound traffic on Hamner at Schleisman.
3. **Other Items:** The meeting included discussions on ways to monitor and better control traffic during SilverLakes events; review of SilverLakes events calendar; and maintenance issues related to flood control detention basin west of SilverLakes and east of JCSD Park.

City staff will continue to meet regularly as necessary to monitor and resolve the identified issues, to maintain communication, and to improve inter-governmental cooperation. The quarterly meetings will be held to include representative Council Members from each City.

Oversight Board Meeting: The City's Oversight Board (OB) to the Successor Agency met today to review and approve the former Redevelopment Agency's Recognized Obligation Payment Schedules (ROPS) for Fiscal Year 2016-2017. During the meeting the OB received information on the status of efforts by City staff through Kosmont Realty Corporation to market and sell two Successor Agency owned vacant land parcels. A formal recommendation to sell the two vacant land parcels will be presented to the OB within the next thirty (30) days.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT:

EDAC: At its meeting of January 26, 2015, Scott da Rosa was sworn in as a new Member of the Economic Development Advisory Council (EDAC), replacing Melissa Villapando, while Council Member Ted Hoffman took over the seat vacated by former Council Member Kathy Azevedo. At that meeting, EDAC Members approved a new subcommittee structure and committed to specific 2016 goals and milestones.

Striders: Promoted as a full-service restaurant with off-track betting on thoroughbred racing, Striders has yet to resume construction at the southeast corner of Hamner Avenue and Fourth Street. However, staff has continued a productive dialogue with representatives from Sportech, the corporation developing the restaurant. The company's San Diego location is now fully operational (www.striders.com), and Norco continues to be scheduled as the second Striders location.

FISCAL AND SUPPORT SERVICES:

Bill Processing: Staff mailed out 1,950 utility bills to Group 3 customers. Staff also mailed out 274 delinquent notices to Group 2 utility customers that had not paid their bill on time. The Group 4 billing, which included 1894 invoices mailed earlier this month, was fully processed this week. Group 4 encompasses Hidden Valley/El Paso, Bluffs & Trail and Corydon Park Area. Of the 1894 mailed, 240 accounts were delinquent. On Wednesday, Public Works placed 76 door tags for those customers that had not paid by Tuesday. Of the 76 accounts, 7 were shut off for non-payment. As of today, 5 customer accounts were restored and 2 remain shut off.

Business License and Cash Receipts: There were 17 new business license applications and 3 renewal Business license applications during the week. Staff processed a combined total of 698 cash receipts from the building counter, Parks and Recreation, utility customers and other miscellaneous accounts receivables totaling \$554,630.89.

Miscellaneous Accounts Receivable: A total of 7 miscellaneous accounts receivable invoices were sent to individuals/agencies totaling \$24,794.58. Miscellaneous accounts receivable invoices are sent to bill for EMS services, hydrant meter billing, damage to City property, encroachment permits, loan payments, trash billing to California Rehabilitation Center and any other services provided by the City other than utility billing and business licenses.

PARKS, RECREATION, AND COMMUNITY SERVICES:

2016 Spring Activities Guide: Staff completed production of the upcoming Spring Activities Guide for 2016. Publication is "live" on the City website and provides information on special events, programs and services offered by the City of Norco for months of February-May 2016.

UNITY: Staff attended the United Neighbors Involving Today's Youth (UNITY) Meeting on Thursday, January 28, 2016 at the Corona Public Library. Staff networked with coalition

agencies and provided vital information on city sponsored programs, services and special events to those in attendance.

Youth T-Ball: Spring Youth T-Ball registration is open now through March 10, 2016. Cost is \$85 per player which includes team jersey, hat and award. Games are slated to begin Saturday, April 9, 2016. Games will be played at Parmenter Park. Volunteer Coaches are being recruited. Summer Concerts in the Park: Staff and sub-committee members are seeking sponsors and bands for the upcoming Summer Concerts in the Park. Special Notes:

- The water line replacement project on Bluff Street and Western Avenue is progressing on schedule. Hydrostatic pressure testing of the new mainlines has been completed and bacteriological testing of the extension that will connect the 16” transmission line to the existing system under Western near Appaloosa is complete. This 12” diameter section of the mainline project has been successfully connected to the existing system and is now in service allowing much needed circulation of the water to this area. The 16” mainlines installed in Bluff Street are currently being disinfected and following bacteriological screening by an outside laboratory the connection of the new mains to our existing system will be scheduled.
- New “Way-Finding” signs have been installed in the Hamner medians near Alhambra Avenue. These signs are dual sided directing travelers to local points of interest and governmental offices.



Engineering

Bluff Street & Western Avenue Water Improvements: The contractor is currently conducting pressure and bacterial testing on the new 16” waterline in Bluff Street as well as the 12” waterline adjacent to the navy base. Testing and flushing is required prior to connecting the new waterline improvements to the City’s potable water distribution

system. Project includes approximately 4,000 linear feet of 6", 10", 12" and 16" waterline that will replace the aging water distribution system in Bluff Street & Western Avenue.

Third Street Project: The contractor has completed their punch list items and they are awaiting final inspection from the City.

Various Waterline Improvement Projects: The City will be requesting proposals for design services for several Capital Improvement Waterline projects throughout town.

Various Storm Drain Improvement Projects: The City has three storm drain improvement projects currently in design by outside engineering consultants

Town Hall Meeting: On Monday, January 25, the Norco Sheriff's Office participated in the Town Hall Meeting, hosted by the Norco Horseman's Association. The Sheriff's Office discussion topics included UNLOAD, Vandalism and Graffiti, and Mail Theft. Sheriff's guest

speakers included Norco High School Principal Rob Ibbetson (UNLOAD) and United States Postal Inspector Dennis Adams (Mail Theft). The Norco Sheriff's Office was grateful to participate in the meeting and extends its gratitude to the Norco Horseman's Association for the opportunity.

FIRE DEPARTMENT / CAL FIRE:

Sandbags: Fire staff continues to distribute sandbags to city residents. 150 sandbags were provided this week.

Community Event: On January 23rd Engine Company 57 participated in the Corona-Norco Unified School Districts Career Day and Expo at RCC Norco Campus. Engine 57 displayed its apparatus and equipment while speaking with more than 150 members of the public regarding career opportunities in the Fire Service, RVC Volunteer Reserve Program, RVC Explorer Program, Fire Safety, and Flood Awareness/Preparedness. Additionally, Firefighter Vera participated as an interviewer in mock job interviews for high school seniors. The engine crew also joined in an open forum discussion panel with members from law enforcement and military organizations to answer questions from community members.



Firefighter Honored: The Norco City Council honored the life of long time Norco resident Barry "Nine Lives" Rezac by presenting his widow a Certificate of Commendation. - WHEREAS Barry Rezac, a long time resident of Norco, Firefighter for nearly 30 years, and avid horseman, was also known as "Nine Lives Rezac" to his firefighting brothers; and
- WHEREAS Mr. Rezac loved being a firefighter, even after retiring in 2009, his eyes would light up at the sight of fire trucks going down the street; and
- WHEREAS the exploits which earned him his nickname included acting as a human shield between two Rottweilers and a family with children, beating the dogs with his fists; he fell 100-feet down a hillside while fighting a brush fire; porches collapsed on him; and he suffered serious burns from an oxygen tank exploding while preparing to enter a burning home to save the occupant; and
- WHEREAS "Nine Lives Rezac" received numerous commendations for his heroism, he was considered a top-notch firefighter, respectful of his co-workers, and had a willingness to do things others would not; and
- WHEREAS the City of Norco wishes to celebrate the memory and accomplishments of Barry Rezac, on behalf of the City Council, thank and commend Mr. Rezac for his ultimate sacrifice in service as a Firefighter and pay respect to his family.


