CITY MANAGER:

Paul Blanco's Good Car Company Opens for Business in Norco: Escrow on the former Successor Agency property closed last Thursday. This property, which was purchased by the City of Norco from the Successor Agency and subsequently sold to Paul Blanco's Good Car Company, will provide extra vehicle storage space for the dealership. Most importantly, Paul Blanco's Good Car Company began selling vehicles in Norco on Monday, June 20, 2016. This is really great news for Paul Blanco's Good Car Company and the City of Norco. The dealership is stocked with plenty of "shiny" vehicles on the lot. Even with the heat wave, the dealership reported selling 7 cars on the first day of business. On Tuesday, I visited the dealership with the Planning Director and the Economic Development Consultant. We were very impressed with their efforts to spruce up their offices.

Paul Blanco's Good Car Company is the second largest used car dealership in the state behind CarMax. Mr. Blanco estimates that his dealership will sell about 150 units on average in Norco every month. This will generate significant sales tax for the City as well as increase local employment. Additionally, the dealership is expected to increase foot traffic to the Norco Auto Mall with the potential for increased business at other dealerships and nearby businesses. A future grand opening is planned.

Regarding the sale of the former Successor Agency parcel, the net proceeds after sales commission and escrow costs was \$768,364.05. This amount has been sent to the County Auditor-Controller for distribution to affected taxing entities. Staff estimates that the City will get 14% or about \$107,000 back into the City's General Fund.

PUBLIC NOTIFICATION:

Jurupa Community Services District: For your information, Jurupa Community Services District will host a Picnic in the Park on June 24-26, 2016, at Eastvale Community Park, corner of Citrus and Hamner Avenue. A fireworks show is scheduled for Saturday, June 25th, at approximately 9 p.m. Norco residents along the Alhambra Bluff, Ridge Ranch and Pali properties should pay close attention to their horses and other animals that may be sensitive to the fireworks display. Northwest Mosquito Abatement and Vector Control: The District will perform an adult mosquito spray treatment on June 24, 2016, to lower the mosquito population affecting a recreational area in the City of Norco. The spray application will be conducted between the hours of 3:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m. at Pikes Peak Park located at 111 Sixth St., Norco, CA. The District will treat this area with Merus 2.0 (EPA Reg. 8329-94), which is approved for use in mosquito control by the US EPA. We have been working hard to use Integrated Pest Management Practices in these areas, and the majority of our efforts focus on preventing mosquito breeding and killing mosquito larvae before they become flying adults. However, due to elevated trap counts, we have decided that adult mosquito control via truck mounted ground fogger is our best means to control the current mosquito populations in these areas. Signs were posted on June 22, 2016, in the areas that will be sprayed to inform the public of our activities. Information regarding the treatment will be posted on our website

Waste Management/EI Sobrante Landfill: Waste 360 published an excellent story about the EI Sobrante Landfill's habitat conservation program. Recently named to *Corporate Responsibility's* list of the 100 Best Corporate Citizens, which ranks public companies based on outstanding corporate responsibility performance, Houston-based Waste Management has earned Wildlife Habitat Council certifications at 116 sites and is preserving 28,000 acres through its "Wildlife at Work" program. The program is aimed at preserving land as wildlife habitats by providing food, water, shelter, cover and space "suitable to animals' needs." ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT:

Historic Preservation: Chuck Wilson, a professional archivist at the University of California, Riverside (UCR), met with Cultural Resources Consultant Bill Wilkman, Historic Preservation Commission Chair Matt Potter and Vice Chair Diana Stiller, and the City's Economic Development Consultant to discuss an opportunity to serve as the Commission's Collections Consultant. He would be responsible for cataloging historic artifacts and documents, and preparing the Bob & Karlene Allen Heritage Room for potential public exhibits.

Caltrans: Staff met with representatives from the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) to discuss options for the Park & Ride lot located between Old Hamner Avenue and the I-15 southbound off-ramp, in consideration of potential future development scenarios between Sixth and Detroit Streets. This northern "gateway" area, close to SilverLakes, is strategically situated for variety of commercial and hospitality uses.

FISCAL AND SUPPORT SERVICES:

Bill Processing: Staff mailed out 2,042 utility bills to Group 2 customers and assessed penalties to 422 delinquent accounts totaling \$7,026. We also mailed out 193 delinquent notices and billed for tag fees totaling \$3,088 to Group 1 utility customers.

Business License and Cash Receipts: There were 9 new business license applications received during the week and 592 renewal applications totaling \$72,177. Staff processed a combined total of 2,050 cash receipts from the Building counter, Parks and Recreation, utility customers and other miscellaneous accounts receivables totaling \$453,268.

Miscellaneous Accounts Receivable: A total of 7 miscellaneous accounts receivable invoices were sent to individuals/agencies totaling \$1,287. Miscellaneous accounts receivable invoices are sent to bill for EMS services, hydrant meter billing, damage to City property, encroachment permits, loan payments, trash billing to California Rehabilitation Center and any other services provided by the City other than utility billing and business licenses.

Accounts Payable: Processed 13 payroll benefit checks totaling \$86,256.



RSO Remembers Deputy Randy Lutz: While patrolling the Norco area on June 22, 1989, Deputy Lutz came upon slow/stopped traffic. Deputy Lutz swerved into the center lane to avoid the traffic jam. After swerving into the center lane, Deputy Lutz collided with a pickup truck. He was killed instantly. Deputy Randy Lutz was employed with Riverside County Sheriff's Department for three years. He was hired on April 29, 1987, and assigned to Riverside Patrol. In June 1989, he was transferred to the Norco Station where he played a major role with initiating the motorcycle enforcement program, where he was assigned. Deputy Lutz attended the Police Reserve Academy at Fullerton College and received his POST certificate in June 1981. He began his law enforcement career in 1982 with the California State Police and in 1983 he joined the San Jacinto Police Department. In 1986, he was named Officer of the Year for his role in the aftermath of the gunshot wounding of a fellow Riverside Sheriff's Deputy.

Response to Calls for Service During the 4th of July Weekend: Fireworks are illegal in Riverside County because of the risk of serious injuries or fires. Riverside County has very diverse terrain with a lot of dry vegetation. Fireworks can easily start a brush fire in this environment. Individuals who cause fires by using illegal fireworks will be held responsible for all fire suppression costs. These costs can run into the millions of dollars. Based on the high volume of calls related to fireworks during holidays such as the 4th of July, the Riverside County Sheriff's Department enacts a protocol to prioritize fireworks-related calls. The protocol for the Jurupa Valley Station will commence on July 3, 2016 at 10:00 PM, and conclude on July 5, 2016 at 12:00 PM. The protocol is as follows:


Reports of fireworks, loud parties, or noise complaints will be broadcast to patrol deputies but a deputy will not be assigned to respond unless the reporting party requests deputy contact. Deputies will continue to respond for reports of fires or gunshots.

Hot Weather Warning for Pet Owners:



K9 Bloodhound "Cooper"

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department 3-month old Bloodhound "Copper" would like to remind all pet owners that it only takes minutes for a pet left in a vehicle on a warm day to succumb to heatstroke and suffocation. Copper is concerned because the weather forecast for most of Riverside County this upcoming week is likely to be over 100 degrees and it is not recommended to leave any animal in parked cars, even for short periods of time, with the air-conditioning on. Air compressors do fail when engines become overheated even in the most modern cars.

Copper says that he and other animals are not able to sweat like humans, so they cool themselves by panting and by sweating through their paws. When the air they are breathing is overheated, the animals can collapse, suffer brain damage and possibly die of heatstroke.

K9 Copper would like to recommend that the residents of Riverside County take the following precautions during the upcoming warm days:

- Leave your pets at home.
- On trips with your pet, bring plenty of fresh drinking water and a bowl.
- Give them plenty of breaks in the shade.
- Take your pet to the veterinarian immediately if you see signs of heat exhaustion, which includes restlessness, excessive thirst, heavy panting, lethargy, dark tongue, rapid pulse, fever, vomiting, glazed eyes, dizziness, or lack of coordination.

As a reminder, it is also a crime to leave an animal confined in an unattended vehicle, Penal Code section 597.7 - Leave or confine an animal in any unattended motor vehicle under conditions that endanger the health or well-being of an animal due to heat, cold, lack of adequate ventilation, or lack of food or water, or other circumstances that could reasonably be expected to cause suffering, disability, or death to the animal. These animals are loving members of our families and are deserving of the best treatment.

Burglary Suspects Arrested: On June 9, 2016, deputies were continuing a vehicle burglary investigation that occurred on June 8, 2016, at a business parking lot, in the 1300 block of Hamner Ave., in the City of Norco. Deputies saw the suspect vehicle and detained three juveniles. The investigation determined the vehicle was stolen on June 8, 2016, from the City of Perris. Stolen property was recovered from a vehicle burglary that just occurred prior to the juveniles being contacted, as well as from a vehicle burglary in the City of Eastvale. The juveniles, all Jurupa Valley residents, were booked into the Riverside County Juvenile Hall for burglary and conspiracy. One of the juveniles was also charged with possession of a firearm and possession of stolen property. The case was submitted to the juvenile District Attorney's Office for criminal prosecution.

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department is committed to the safety of the citizens of Norco and will be vigilant in investigating all crimes of this nature. June 11, Driver's License/DUI Checkpoint Results: Riverside County Sheriff's Department/Jurupa Valley Station/Norco Office conducted a DUI/Driver's License checkpoint on June 11, 2016, at Hidden Valley Pkwy and Corona Avenue between the hours of 8:00 p.m. and 2:00 a.m. Checkpoints are placed in locations that have the greatest opportunity for achieving drunk and drugged driving deterrence and provide the greatest safety for officers and the public.

DUI/Driver's License checkpoints have been shown to lower DUI deaths and injuries. A major component of these checkpoints are the deterrent effects it has on those who might drive drunk or drug impaired, bringing about more awareness and encouraging everyone to use sober designated drivers. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), checkpoints have provided the most effective documented results of any of the DUI enforcement strategies, while also yielding considerable cost savings of \$6 for every \$1 spent. Ninety Percent of California drivers approve of checkpoints.

DUI/Driver's License checkpoint results:

- 735 Vehicles traveled through the checkpoint.
- 673 Vehicles were screened.
- 3 Drivers were given field sobriety tests.
- 2 DUI-Alcohol suspects were arrested.
- 2 Drivers were cited for driving while unlicensed.
- 6 Drivers were cited for driving while their driver's license was suspended.
- 7 Vehicles were towed.

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department/Jurupa Valley Station/Norco Office will be conducting additional DUI/Driver's License Checkpoint operations throughout the year, in our ongoing commitment to lowering deaths and injuries upon our streets and highways.




