CITY COUNCIL APPROVES STRATEGIC PLAN

Following unanimous approvals by all city commission and advisory boards, the City Council on Wednesday approved a written Strategic Plan that will guide City decisions and actions over the next 3-5 years. The Strategic Plan includes a revised mission statement, revised vision statement and five (5) separate strategic priorities along with specific actions that are necessary to achieving the strategic priorities. The strategic priorities which were developed by commission and advisory board members, City Council members, staff and residents are as follows:

1. Infrastructure – Establish funding for planning, maintenance, replacement and development of infrastructure
2. Community Outreach – Engage with the community through excellent customer service, communication and programs
3. Financial Stability – Assure financial stability by identifying new revenue sources and continuing prudent financial management
4. Economic Development – Increase transient occupancy tax (TOT) and sales tax by attracting new businesses, retaining existing businesses, and attracting tourism
5. Public Safety – Improve the quality of life by enhancing public safety services

Copies of the final Strategic Plan, with detailed specific work plans, will be available at City Hall and online through the City's website by the middle of next week.

RECRUITMENT FOR THE YOUTH ADVISORY COUNCIL BEGINS

The deadline to submit applications is 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, September 13, 2016. Applications will not be received or considered after that date. The Norco City Council will consider and make the appointments at the City Council meeting on September 21, 2016. Applications will be accepted to fill nine (9) positions. Terms are one year (October – May), coinciding with the school year.

Requirements to serve on the Norco Youth Advisory Council include: being a current registered student, grades 9 – 12, at Norco High School or John F. Kennedy Middle College High School; never have been convicted of a felony; and must take the Oath of Office.

The newly established Norco Youth Advisory Council shall be empowered to promote community involvement with, for, and by youth, review proposals for programs, projects, and facilities as they pertain to youth; assist in the evaluation and planning of programs and services with an emphasis on youth; review and make recommendations on matters pertaining to youth programming and services to the various City Commissions and the City Council; promote youth involvement in community events, programs, and volunteer projects through public education, schools, and community organizations; and act in an advisory capacity to the City Council in all other policy matters pertaining to youth.



SPARK OF RECOGNITION

At its meeting of August 17, 2016, the City Council recognized Sparky's Electric with a handsome plaque, as the latest honoree in the City's Business Appreciation Initiative. ACCORDING TO THE PROFESSOR...

Jack Corgel, Ph.D., a consultant at CBRE Hotels and Professor at Cornell University's prestigious School of Hotel Administration, reports there appears to be very little risk of an oversupply of hotel rooms in the United States, despite a relatively lively pace of development. Because of delays in construction, higher construction costs and strict lending criteria, the market has not become overheated and demand for new rooms is expected to continue for the next two years. In Norco, staff is aggressively pursuing hotel contacts, actively promoting Norco as an incredibly attractive site for hotel development.

On August 20, 2016 at 10:00 AM Jeff Anderson from Rebuilding Warriors will present a service dog to one of our deserving veterans, Trish Ellis, U.S. Air Force Veteran Ellis will receive a German Shepard breed named "Nala." The ceremony will be held this Saturday at the George Ingalls Veterans Memorial Plaza. Many of us are aware of the good work Mr. Anderson does regarding helping our veterans and service men and women who return from service to their country. Mr. Anderson provides service dogs that are highly trained socialized service/companions to Honorably Discharged Veterans, diagnosed as amputees as well as those with PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder), TBI (Traumatic Brain Injury). The dogs provide emotional relief for those suffering veterans and service men and women who are affected by the effects of warfare. The George Ingalls Veterans Executive Committee has co-sponsored this program ran by Rebuilding Warriors a 501(c) 3 non-profit to host K-9 presentations.



	580 Eighth Street	Replaced black poly service with new 1" copper and all new brass fittings.
POTABLE MAIN LINE REPAIRS:	Western Avenue	Upon excavation of the 16" transmission line that runs thru the property between the Navy base and Bronco Avenue, deterioration of a bell connection was repaired with a full circle stainless clamp. The main line was approximately 11 feet deep and the surrounding soil was extremely rocky making the excavation laborious. FISCAL AND SUPPORT SERVICES UPDATE

BILL PROCESSING

Staff mailed out 2,062 utility bills to Group 2 customers and assessed penalties to 372 delinquent accounts totaling \$6,916. We also mailed out 210 delinquent notices and billed for tag fees totaling \$3,630 to Group 1 utility customers that had not paid their bill on time.

BUSINESS LICENSE AND CASH RECEIPTS

There were 10 new business license applications received during the week and 64 renewal applications totaling \$10,342. Staff processed a combined total of 1,820 cash receipts from the building counter, Parks and Recreation, utility customers and other miscellaneous accounts receivables totaling \$635,311.

MISCELLANEOUS ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

A total of 33 miscellaneous accounts receivable invoices were sent to individuals/agencies totaling \$292,018. Miscellaneous accounts receivable invoices are sent to bill for EMS services, hydrant meter billing, damage to City property, encroachment permits, loan payments, trash billing to California Rehabilitation Center and any other services provided by the City other than utility billing and business licenses.

NORCO SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT UPDATE

LOOSE HORSE ON I-15 FREEWAY-SAFELY RECOVERED

On Wednesday, August 17, during the morning hours, a trainer was walking a horse on Sixth Street, in the City of Norco. The horse was suddenly spooked, got loose, and fled west on Sixth Street. As the horse neared the I-15 Freeway, it fled onto the I-15 southbound onramp and travelled down the freeway. Fortunately, Norco Deputy Randy Postoian was nearby, advised of the circumstances and reacted quickly. Deputy Postoian worked with the California Highway Patrol to provide a traffic break and slow/stop traffic near where the horse was located. Deputy Postoian, the horse trainer, along with several passing motorists, were able to approach the horse and contain it, just before it fled into the traffic lanes. The horse was subsequently walked off the freeway by the horse trainer and reunited with its owner. The horse was not injured. Had it not been for the quick actions of the Norco deputy, the California Highway Patrol, several concerned citizens, and Norco Animal Control, this incident could have ended in a tragedy. Good work by all involved!

PRESS RELEASE: NORCO VANDALISM SUSPECT ARRESTED



On Monday, August 15, 2016, at 11:43 a.m., deputies responded to a vandalism at a business, located in the 1100 block of Mountain Ave., in the City of Norco. A male suspect was captured on surveillance camera footage damaging the building. The vandalism occurred on August 14, 2016, when the business was closed. With the camera footage, the deputies were able to identify the suspect. During this investigation, the suspect was located nearby and arrested. Arrested for felony vandalism was Frank Portillo Mata, age 59, of Norco. Mata was booked into the Robert Presley Detention Center. PRESS RELEASE: BANK ROBBERY

On Tuesday, August 16, 2016, at 3:20 p.m., deputies assigned to the Norco Sheriff's Office were dispatched to Citibank, located in the 2900 block of Hamner Ave., Norco, regarding a bank robbery that just occurred. The investigation revealed that a lone suspect entered the bank and presented the teller with a demand note. The teller complied with the suspect's demands, providing the suspect with an undisclosed amount of money. The suspect exited the bank and was last seen running southbound on Hamner Avenue. There were no injuries as a result of this incident. The suspect was described as White or Hispanic male adult, 20-25-years-old, last seen wearing black shorts, black T-shirt and a grey baseball hat. The Riverside County Sheriff's

Department is committed to the safety of the citizens of Norco and will be vigilant in investigating all crimes of this nature. PRESS RELEASE: VIOLENT CRIME INCREASES IN 2016

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department has released preliminary crime statistics for the first 6 months of calendar year 2016, indicating an overall increase of 4% in all reported FBI Part I crimes. Violent Crime increased by 14.1% throughout the Sheriff's areas of Riverside County (both unincorporated areas and cities), along with 3.1% increase in overall property crime in those same areas. Homicides have nearly doubled from 14 in 2015 to 27 so far in 2016. There was a 19% increase in the number of robberies and an 11.4% increase in aggravated assaults reported to the Sheriff. Auto thefts have increased by over 18% in 2016.

Within just the unincorporated areas of Riverside County, Violent Crime **decreased by 3.9%**, and Property Crimes **increased by 3.7%**, with all FBI Part I Crime in the unincorporated areas **up by 2.9%** in 2016, over the same time period the previous year. In the unincorporated areas of Riverside County, the overall increase in reported Part 1 crimes was impacted the most by robberies (increased by 22.1%) and larceny-theft (increased by 9.8%).

Patrol staffing in the County's unincorporated areas is set through discretionary funding established each year by the Riverside County Board of Supervisors, while in contrast, the Sheriff's contract city partners (city councils and city managers) each establish their own patrol staffing levels for their respective cities. Unincorporated patrol staffing countywide has been set for awhile at 1.04 sworn staff/1,000 population due to county budget constraints, including for the first 6 months of 2016.

The Sheriff's Department serves as the contract policing agency partner for 17 of Riverside County's 28 cities and also serves the unincorporated areas of Riverside County for criminal investigations. Altogether, the Sheriff is responsible for policing nearly 1.4 million residents of the County's population of over 2.3 million. Annually Sheriff's Department dispatchers receive over 1.6 million phone calls from the public and dispatch nearly 900,000 calls for service (CFS) by Sheriff's staff, with nearly 1/3 being in-progress calls for service. Riverside County is the 4th most populous of California's 58 counties, and the 10th most populous county within the nation.

NORCO SHERIFF'S DEPT. UPDATE CONT.

Post-PROP 47 drug and property crime jail bookings from all agencies within Riverside County made a sharp decline in the first 6 months of 2015. Those booking numbers are now increasing in 2016 to pre-PROP 47 levels. In addition, Federal court-ordered early releases from our jail system in Riverside County that decreased in 2015, are now reversing course and increasing in numbers during 2016.
