THE GREAT CALIFORNIA SHAKEOUT EARTHQUAKE DRILL

Employees at Norco City Hall participated in the Great California ShakeOut Earthquake Drill today, 10/20, at 10:20 a.m. Employees were ready to drop, cover and hold on as if there were a major earthquake occurring at that very moment, and stay in position for 60 seconds. With help from CAL FIRE Riverside/Norco Fire Department, everyone was evacuated and firefighters were able to successfully search and secure the building.

The Great California ShakeOut Earthquake Drill occurs every October with the main goal of preparing Californians for major earthquakes. Anyone in California can participate, from a single individual at their home to a major company at the office. Talk to your coworkers, neighbors and friends about the ShakeOut and encourage their participation.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

CHAMBER MUSIC

Staff met with the President & CEO of the Norco Area Chamber of Commerce & Visitors Center to discuss the organization’s interest in coordinating with the City in pursuing the Strategic Directions and Action Plans enumerated in the City of Norco Strategic Plan, adopted by City Council on August 17, 2016. The Chamber, which will be presenting its Annual Report to City Council next month, shares many of the same interests as the City of Norco and its participation is always appreciated.

TIPPIN’ OUR HAT TO BOB

At its meeting of October 19, 2016, the City Council recognized Bob’s Big Boy as its latest honoree in the City’s Business Appreciation Initiative. This program recognizes enterprises making meaningful contributions to the community, whether Fortune 500 corporations or mom-and-pop merchants. The Economic Development Advisory Council (EDAC) nominates the local businesses to be honored, and a page in the Economic Development section of the City’s website pays tribute to them. The local Bob’s, which is famous for its statue of Bob with a cowboy hat (the only one in the nation), is very active in the Norco community.

EARLY CHECK-IN

CBRE Hotels, the nation’s leading hospitality research organization, has reported on national hotel demand and pricing for the second quarter of 2016. After a surprisingly weak first quarter, growth in demand rebounded, resulting in a record level of occupancy nationwide, and revenue per available room increased significantly. In terms of capital investment, the first half of 2016 lags behind a very robust 2015, but the revenue outlook for hotels nationally is still positive moving into 2017. In Norco, the Hampton Inn and Fairfield Inn & Suites are both performing exceptionally well and the City continues to experience a severe shortage of hotel rooms. Staff continues to pursue opportunities with several major national hotel brands that have expressed an interest in Norco.

FISCAL AND SUPPORT SERVICES UPDATE

BILL PROCESSING

Staff mailed out 2,068 utility bills to Group 2 customers and assessed penalties to 362 delinquent accounts totaling \$6,747. We also mailed out 221 delinquent notices and billed for tag fees totaling \$3,536 to Group 1 utility customers that had not paid their bill on time.

BUSINESS LICENSE AND CASH RECEIPTS

There were 8 new business license applications received during the week and 15 renewal applications totaling \$2,295. Staff processed a combined total of 1,602 cash receipts from the building counter, Parks and Recreation, utility customers and other miscellaneous accounts receivables totaling \$719,666.

MISCELLANEOUS ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

A total of 19 miscellaneous accounts receivable invoices were sent to individuals/agencies totaling \$36,776. Miscellaneous accounts receivable invoices are sent to bill for EMS services, hydrant meter billing, damage to City property, encroachment permits, loan payments, trash billing to California Rehabilitation Center and any other services provided by the City other than utility billing and business licenses.



NORCO SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT UPDATE

VEHICLE THEFT INVESTIGATION/ARREST:

On Wednesday, October 18, 2016, at 9:48 a.m., a deputy observed a suspicious vehicle in a parking lot in the 2000 block of River Rd., in the City of Norco. The occupants, a male and a female, exited the vehicle and entered a local business. Upon checking the vehicle, the deputy learned the vehicle was stolen from the City of Corona on September 29, 2016.

When the deputy attempted to contact the occupants, they had left the business without returning to the stolen vehicle. A search of the area was done and the occupants were located a short distance away. After continuing the investigation, the male was arrested.

Preston Kamraye Keaaloha, age 23, of Corona, was arrested and booked into the Robert Presley Detention Center for unlawful taking of a vehicle and possession of stolen property.

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department is committed to the safety of the citizens of Norco and will be vigilant in investigating all crimes of this nature. This investigation is ongoing and we are asking anyone with additional information to contact Deputy Bloomer at the Norco Sheriff's Office at 951-270-5673.

Vehicle Theft Prevention Tips from the National Crime Prevention Council:

- Never leave your vehicle unattended with keys in the ignition.
- Lock your doors and keep the windows closed, even when parked in front of your home.
- Park in busy and well-lighted areas.
- Do not leave valuables-GPS, GPS holder, cell phone in plain view.
- Equip your vehicle with an alarm or other anti-theft device.
- Never leave your personal documents in your vehicle.
- Report auto theft immediately. Provide local authorities with the make/model/license plate and vehicle id number.



For law enforcement agencies, these competitions are instrumental in the further education of K9 teams by comparing training programs and team performance.





TAKING BACK UNWANTED PRESCRIPTION DRUGS SATURDAY, OCTOBER 22, 2016 FROM 10 A.M. – 2 P.M.

On Saturday, October 22, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will give the public its 12th opportunity in six years to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Bring your pills for disposal to any site. (The DEA cannot accept liquids or needles or sharps, only pills or patches.) The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

Last April, Americans turned in 447 tons (over 893,000 pounds) of prescription drugs at almost 5,400 sites operated by the DEA and more than 4,200 of its state and local law enforcement partners. Overall, in its 11 previous Take Back events, DEA and its partners have taken in over 6.4 million pounds—about 3,200 tons—of pills.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines—flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash—both pose potential safety and health hazards.
